## MAJOR BARBARA

### *Major Barbara* Opens This Weekend

The CGCC Theater Department's spring production, *Major Barbara*, opens this Thursday, June 1, in the Lecture Hall. *Major Barbara*, is a comedy that brings to life one of George Bernard Shaw's most lovable and inspiring characters, a big-hearted young woman with very human passions...and uncompromising ideals. With his genius for combining high comedy and big ideas, the Nobel Prize-winning playwright manages to make us laugh and think at the same time.

*Major Barbara* raises some thorny issues about religion, war, politics and social justice and questions the very notion of idealism. Barbara, a Salvation Army major, believes she can convert her father, a seemingly amoral realist and Europe's richest

arms manufacturer. Yet, in the course of three acts, as Shaw skewers a parade of fools and hypocrites, Barbara wrestles with the complex and disturbing relationships between religion, government and business.

All the characters ultimately find themselves face to face with the most vexing and perplexing question of all: must one give up idealism to make the world a better place? As timely now as when Shaw wrote it nearly a century ago, *Major Barbara* is a true classic.

The play is being presented by the TA 180 Theater Rehearsal and Performance class, and features Elizabeth Harrington and Robin Garrett alternating in the role of Barbara, Joshua Ott as Adolphus Cusins, and Carl McNew as Andrew Undershaft. The other cast members are Kathleen

O'Connor McNew, Benjamin Garrett, Noah Harrington, Jennifer Fulfer, Chad Morrison, Kristi Gudmunson, Chad Smith, Nicole Needham, Nathan Joel Lane, Adam Jones, Keenon Williams, Andrew Burke, Elizabeth Hinatsu, and Michele Bardes. The play is directed by CGCC Theater Instructor Richard Parker.

*Major Barbara* is being performed for two weekends Thursday through Saturday evenings, with performances on June 1, 2, 3, 8, 9, and 10. Curtain time is 7:30 p.m.

Tickets are \$8.00 for general admission, and \$5.00 for any student or CGCC faculty and staff.

## FACILITIES SERVICES

The demolition activities are complete. By Friday June 2<sup>nd</sup> Elder will have begun demobilization and will be removing their equipment from the College Campus. They have completed their obligations to the College on schedule and on budget. We appreciate their efforts to conduct the demolition activities with consideration to the needs of the student's faculty and staff. We now have a momentary period of calm before the site development begins.

On May 20<sup>th</sup> all interested neighbors of The Dalles Campus were invited to attend an informational meeting updating them on the Capital Construction plans. The meeting was chaired by Dennis Whitehouse, Executive Director of Facilities Services. The National Guard also sent a contingent of staff to discuss the

Guard's plans for a "National Guard Training Center" to be constructed on the eastern edge of the College property. The expected start date of those construction activities is contingent upon the release of Federal Government funding. This funding, slated for 2009, could possibly be accelerated to permit construction activities to begin as early as 2007.

We continue to work on multiple Requests for Proposals and negotiations with varied professionals related to the construction in both Hood River and The Dalles. The design process proceeds very well, we have a great deal of confidence in the team we have assembled to perform the manifold design and engineering functions.

A very successful Neighborhood Meeting was hosted by the College at the Hood River Armory. This

meeting, also chaired by Dennis Whitehouse, articulated the results of the Site Workshop and the Design Charette held by the College from May 9 to 12. Robert Esau, lead designer for DLR Group on the Hood River Center interpreted the designs created by the groups and the process that lead to the selection of the ideal location on the Hood River site. The group was permitted to preview the initial design concept resulting from the Charette—a compilation of the best features of the three designs. The meeting was well attended and the Hood River constituents are very excited about the plans to develop the Hood River Center in their neighborhood.

### CONGRATULATIONS TO THE CGCC GRANTS TEAM!!

Congratulations to the CGCC Grants Team for a successful review from the Department of Labor for the college's High Growth Job Training Initiative Nursing/Health Occupations Grant. Christine Chudd, Chief, Discretionary Grants Unit of the Office of Discretionary Programs and Elina Mnatasakanova, CGCC's Federal Project Officer for the grant spent May 30 - June 1 at the college reviewing policies, procedures, reporting, accounting, and outcomes measures for the nursing and health occupations programs funded from the grant. The college received several commendations and one area in particular that they say will be reported as a "best practice model" is the tremendous support and collaborative partnership we receive from our regional health care industry providers. Christine stated that, "this college and project exemplify what these grants are for and that is to meet the local need of high growth industries in a collaborative and sustainable manner." The college has exceeded the grants goals for enrollment and successful completions prior to the end of the grant period. Although the college has not received official notice, we were also told that our request to receive a no-cost extension

for the grant through next year will be approved! ## INSTRUCTIONAL HAPPENINGS

This is a brief update for our campus colleagues.

The folks in Instruction have been busy creating, meeting, scheduling events, closing out grants, preparing for a Department of Labor Site Review Visit, working with Instructional Council in assessing the college's

readiness for seeking its own accreditation, and spending time with business, agency, and industry partners. A few highlights include program development in the areas of pre-engineering and technology, culinary arts, welding and metal sculpture, business and retail

management. Suzanne Burd is working closely with OSU Extension and other agencies to offer workshops and trainings for wine grape growers to test the feasibility of a viticulture program as that industry expands in the Gorge. Please let us know if you have any questions.

## CONSOLIDATE LOANS NOW—Advice from your financial aid office

On July 1, 2006, the federal government is raising the loan interest rate on federal Stafford loans. The financial aid offices at PCC and CGCC are gearing up to help students contact their lenders for information on consolidation of existing loans so students may lock in their current and past loans at a lower rate before the new interest rate is announced.

Many borrowers choose to consolidate their student loans through the Federal Family Education Loan Program (FFELP) because it can provide long-lasting benefits, including a lower monthly payment and a fixed interest rate. You may want to apply for a consolidation loan now, even if you have not completed your academic program. As a FFELP borrower, you are eligible to consolidate your outstanding FFELP loans if you are in your grace

period, or currently in repayment on your student loans.

How do you consolidate and then continue with your classes in the Summer or Fall terms?

\*Call your lender and request that loans be placed into immediate repayment status.

\*Request a consolidation application from your lender.

\*Complete and submit your application.

\*Once the consolidation loan is made, immediately request an in-school deferment.

You must be in your grace period or in a repayment status on the current loans you wish to include in the consolidation. **IF** you consolidate during grace, you will lock in that lower rate; however, you may lose some of your grace period. *After June 30, 2006, entering repayment early to consolidate your*

*loans will not be possible.*

What are some of the advantages to loan consolidation now?

\*It eliminates multiple payments to multiple lenders or servicers, giving the borrower a new loan with one holder and a single monthly payment.

\*It may provide an opportunity for the borrower to lock in a low interest rate. It may allow an extended repayment period, depending on total debt. This usually means a lower monthly payment.

Stop by the Financial Aid Office in Student Services to pick up an information packet on consolidation and/or make an appointment to talk with Sharyn Anderson, the CGCC Financial Aid Specialist, about contacting your lender and pursuing your consolidation options. Call 541-506-6021 for an appointment.

## CGCC Full Year Scholarships

The Columbia Gorge Community College Full Year Foundation Scholarship application is now available for the 2006-2007 academic year. Anyone planning to take credit classes at Columbia Gorge Community College this coming Fall is eligible to apply for this tuition scholarship. It will cover Fall, Winter, and Spring terms and recipients can be awarded up to 12 credits per term. Applications may be picked up in the Student Services office, in Building 1 on campus or accessed on CGCC's website @ [www.cgcc.cc.or.us](http://www.cgcc.cc.or.us).

All applicants are interviewed by a committee as part of the application process. Interview appointments will be scheduled at the time that completed applications are submitted. Applications must be hand delivered to the Student Services office at Columbia Gorge Community College no later than 12 noon, Thursday, August 24, 2006.
